# World Youth Day Lisbon 2023

#### Dear sisters and brothers,

The Wagga pilgrimage group has just returned from World Youth Day in Lisbon via the Holy Land and with time in Avila for reflection at the end. It was a privilege to be with our young people who had personal, faithfilled experiences and who shared these. For much of the time, our group of 32 had the joy of being one with 15 Oblate WYD youth pilgrims.

Pope Francis, following on from Pope St John Paul 2 and Pope Benedict XVI, made the most of the opportunity and met with the young people on three other occasions (welcoming ceremony, Stations of the Cross, Adoration and Benediction at the Vigil) which they treasured and valued. One of his constant messages was that there is room for all of them in the Church. He said this many times.

At the heart of World Youth Day, though, is young people responding to the Pope's invitation to come and celebrate Mass with him. This year that Mass was on the Feast of the Transfiguration and 1.5 million young people (and their bishops, priests and other leaders) came to worship our Lord with Pope Francis.

# For World Youth Day.

World Youth Day is a technicolor, all-you-can-see buffet. There are flags from all over the world and people of so many different ethnicities. It's beautiful.

There's just one color you don't see: gray. It's practically nonexistent in national flags, and World Youth Day attracts a young crowd.

Pope John Paul II initiated World Youth Day, with the first official gathering in 1986. Since then, the event has taken place every few years in different countries around the world.

World Youth "Day" is technically an entire week of events. There are liturgies, concerts, catechetical sessions, and opportunities to meet pilgrims from all over the world. The week concludes with a Mass celebrated by the pope.

Some WYDs are large, and then some are really large. The closing Mass at World Youth Day in the Philippines in 1995 drew five million people — a world record for a single religious event,

Young people serious about their faith often feel lonely if their friends or classmates do not share the same fervor. At World Youth Day, they see that they're not alone. They can even make

a million new Catholic friends.

The host countries have shaped the four World Youth Days I've attended in different ways, but the positive energy is always the same. People sing and dance and chant everywhere you go. It feels like a little taste of heaven (except for the long lines and portable tollets).

At the opening Mass for one World Youth Day, our group was so far from the ministers of Communion that receiving the Eucharist seemed impossible. One of the students in my group looked at me with puppy dog eyes and asked, "Can we receive Jesus?" We formed a 25-person train so we wouldn't get split up and made our way toward the altar. The same student turned to her friend after receiving Communion and gave a high five. They had encountered Jesus — an experience that continued throughout the week. It's what World Youth Day is really about.

Whether we are participating in World Youth Day or watching from afar, let us pray that we hunger to receive Jesus and experience the universality of our faith.

Our media seems to notice and measure World Youth Day mainly by the numbers and being in such a large crowd was impressive - especially when it fell totally silent for 15 minutes during adoration. Certainly, one could not think that one was the last young catholic in the world. However, our pilgrims (and I guess all of the others) valued the time for the Christ-centredness of it and for the 'Churchness' of it.

In his homily at the WYD Mass, Pope Francis linked this devotion to Jesus Transfiguration. Pope Francis invited the young people to be "radiant in their youthfulness. The Church, the world, needs you as much as the Earth needs the rain." Taking a line from the Gospel, he warned us to be careful of selfishness disguised as love. "Listen to

Jesus, for he will show you which paths are those of love." "Listen to Him." he repeated.

Using another line from the Gospel, Pope Francis urged the young people to act on the dreams, the hopes, that God has put in their hearts. "Do not be afraid", he reassured us. Jesus is with us. What a beautiful way to be radiant with and for Jesus.

I thank the young people who gave three weeks of their lives and significant funds to travel with us and to Fr Connell Perry, our Chaplain, Andrew Watson and Sandra Harvey, our coordinators, and our nurse Emma. Thank you to you for supporting our fundraising and for praying for us.

Ronald Donoghue was born on 1 August 1955 in Kempsey. One of nine children, he attended St Margaret Mary's Primary School in Merrylands, Marist Bros College in Parramatta and Merrylands High School.

Fr Ron was a fine boxer in his day, and also had a black belt in taekwondo. While working as a security guard, he developed a passion for reading the Church Fathers which led him to consider the Priesthood and religious life, and at age 31 he began his seminary studies.

Fr Ron Donoghue was ordained to the priesthood at St Michael's Cathedral Wagga Wagga on 25 April 1998 by Most Rev Michael Malone, Bishop of Maitland-Newcastle.

As a member of the Confraternity of Christ the Priest, Fr Ron served the Diocese of Wagga Wagga in the parishes of Lavington, Thurgoona, Albury and West Wagga. In recent years, Fr Ron has been the caretaker for the Confraternity of Christ the Priest property at San Isidore. He was a steady and wise support to the Confraternity students.

In his later years, the highlight of Fr Ron's every day was Holy Mass which he offered with deep contemplation and heartfelt singing.

Living with heart disease for many



years, Fr Ron passed away at home in his sleep. **Please pray for the repose**

We give thanks to God for the extraordinary life and ministry of Fr Terence Mahedy. It is with great sadness that the Diocese of Wagga Wagga announces the death of Fr Terence Francis Mahedy on 3 August 2023.

Terence Francis Mahedy was born on 4 October 1940 at Lockhart. He grew up on the family farm at Urangeline, near Lockhart, with siblings Annette, Pauline, Catherine and John, and attended Glenara Primary School (near Urana) and St Patrick's College, Goulburn.

In his early twenties, Terence joined the seminary. He left after a couple of years, returning to the farm to help his family after his father died.


In 1979 Terence began teaching scripture and catechetics in Wagga, attaining a Catechetical Diploma in 1981. He was 40 when he reentered the seminary. He believed his life experience helped him relate to people. "I have walked the same path as them," he said. He completed his theological studies in 1984 at St Paul's National Seminary in Kensington.

Fr Terence Mahedy was Ordained at St Michael's Cathedral, Wagga Wagga on 23 September 1988 by Bishop William Brennan in the presence of 42 priests who welcomed him into their community.

Fr Terence was the Spiritual Director for the Wagga Wagga Cursillo movement for 25 years, leaving the role in 2015, and has been the Chaplain to the Catholic Women's League Wagga Wagga since December 2008

Since his ordination Fr Terence has served the Diocese of Wagga in the parishes of Albury, Leeton, and Griffith, and most notably, Culcairn since 1997 and Holbrook since 2008. Terence was generously faithful and caring to his parishioners, and at every opportunity actively engaged with the whole local community where he is much loved and respected.

From the booklet for Fr Terence Mahedy's Ordination on 23 September 1988:

# REFUGEE NEIL PARA **BEGINS HIS 1000KM WALK FOR FREEDOM**

Sri Lankan refugee and asylum seeker Neil Para set out on 1 August for his 1000 kilometre walk for freedom to raise awareness of the plight of refugees in Australia and is due to arrive in Wagga Wagga on 20 August.

A large crowd of supporters and have all the rights that Australian from his hometown Ballarat and surrounds farewelled him and launched the milestone walk to the Prime Minister's electorate office in Sydney where Neil will deliver a petition.

RAR Supporter Brett said: "Neil is the bravest man I know. At the end of this we hope that one day, we can attend Neil, Sugaa and the girls' ceremony to become citizens, wouldn't that be a wonderful moment. Ten years too long - Neil is very much a part of this community."

Lieke Janssen from Refugee Action Collective said: "Neil is walking 1000km for himself, his family and over 7000 people that are still being left behind under the Albanese's no-one will be left behind government. Politicians there is no need to hide behind this excuse 'we cannot comment on individual cases.' Neil is walking for thousands, every politician come stand behind Neil and the thousands that deserve this.

"1000km is gonna be challenging and hard but it's nothing compared with the challenges these refugees have been living with without a permanent visa for so long, every day they face consequences of living without this security. We need permanent visas and freedom now."

Ballarat city councillor Belinda Coates said: "Neil gives back so much to this community. You are doing this for others to adjust what has been happening in this country for too long. I hope this is the start of the change of that conversation."

The 7000+ refugees missed out when the Federal Government announced in February that refugees who held Temporary Protection and Safe Haven Enterprise Visas could apply for permanent visas.

#### They are denied work rights, study rights and even Medicare access.

Apart from being granted the freedom to work, Neil also wants refugees to be granted the freedom to vote, become an Australian citizen citizens do

Neil, who will walk from his home in Ballarat to the Prime Minister's Sydney Electorate office, has lived in Australia in limbo for 11 years without a permanent visa, steady job or continuous Medicare with his wife Sugaaand their three young daughters Nivash, Kartie and Australian-born Nive who has Australian citizenship.

They have lived under various immigration restrictions even though they are ambitious to build careers. Neil was a hairdresser in Sri Lanka and wants to be a police officer in Australia, while Sugaa would love to be an aged care worker.

The Federal Government's Resolution of Status (RoS)permanent visa announcement this year paved the way for permanent visas for 19,000 refugees1 with a pathway to citizenship and family reunion (who were on temporary protection or safe haven enterprise visas at the time of the announcement). Sadly, Neil is one of thousands still missing out. Most of these were maritime arrivals.

Beyond trying to find certainty for his family, for whom return to strifetorn Sri Lanka would be dangerous, Neil is advocating for refugees who've been left behind in similar circumstances to him

"I'm calling on the government to end the uncertainty for all refugees seeking a safe home. Please grant us permanent visas and the freedom to work," Neil said. "I am also walking so that refugee children can have certainty.

#### Walking From Home in Ballarat to the Prime Minister's Heartland of Marrickville

Neil will leave Ballarat at 8am on August 1 from the office of Ballarat MP Catherine King and trek to Prime Minister Anthony Albanese's electorate office in Marrickville, Sydney arriving in September.

With support from regional refugee advocacy groups, such as Rural Australians for Refugees, Neil

plans to deliver a petition on foot to Mr Albanese's office and later attend a refugee rally organised by Refugee Action Collective. The petition has over 11,000 signatures but many more are needed.

In the petition Neil says: "I fled war and persecution in Sri Lanka and arrived in Australia via Christmas Island in 2012. Asylum seekers like me from militarised parts of the world seek safety in Australia. Instead, we experienced 14 months of detention in immigration detention centres that almost broke our spirit. But we are resilient, and we carry the hope that we'll call Australia home one day".

"Australia represents refuge from the turmoil we were escaping. Now I stand with refugees as the founder of the Union of Australian Refugees (UAR)."

The Union of Australian Refugees was formed this year to bring refugees together, create awareness and be their voice. Its motto is "Be Seen, Be Heard" and while they were seen during a four day sit down at Parliament House, he said it appeared they were not properly

Neil says in the petition: "We are tired of living in limbo. It has been more than a decade. We have spent time in detention, the harshest time of our lives, but there is still no clarity about our status. We cannot return to a country where we don't feel safe and we don't feel at home. We yearn to contribute to the society we now call

The family fled Sri Lanka to Malaysia where they remained for four years having been given refugee status by the United Nations. They came to Australia by boat and lived in detention in Darwin, then community detention in Dandenong before they came to Ballarat in 2013 (to seek fast-track visas, after applying for a permanent visa while in detention). Unfortunately, after four months in Ballarat their bridging visas were revoked, leaving the couple almost suicidal.

"We didn't know what we were going to do, we didn't even speak English," Neil said.

Ten years later, Neil's family is still waiting, and the strain of living in limbo has taken a huge toll on their mental health.

The family survives through the generosity of the local community, groups such as Rural Australians for Refugees, friends and allies.

Neil and Sugaa do volunteer work in Ballarat to give back to the local community which has supported them. Both have been continuously involved in community committees.

Neil is a tireless volunteer for the SES and leads a crew, while Sugaa has volunteered for years in aged care (Ballarat Health Services) and at the visitor information centre. Their eldest daughter also volunteers at Vinnies and Ballarat Information Centre.

The couple learnt English through their volunteer roles as their nonresident status precluded them from formal study.

Neil has also arranged local events in Ballarat to raise awareness of the mental health issues that refugees and asylum seekers experience due to being denied residency and the right to work.

The family gives back to their community. Neil raised over \$1000 for homeless people donated to Ballarat Uniting Care and received an award as one of Australia's Best Neighbours in 2020. His wife and daughters have donated their hair at least 12 times (3 times x 4 people) to benefit cancer sufferers, Sugaa has raised more than \$1000 for Ballarat Hospice Care and the children have raised and donated \$602


for a primary school in Ararat. Neil also raised over \$2500 for Australian children with cancer through the Great Cycle Challenge

In 2018, Neil also received a Refugee and Asylum Seekers Recognition Award from the Friends of Refugees for his community services and in 2017 a Community Service award from local Member Catherine King for service at Black Hill School

#### Neil's goals for the Walk

- 1. Children born in Australia should be given Citizenship with the same rights as other Australian children.
- 2. All children who go to or went to Australian schools should also be given Citizenship or permanent residency with a pathway to become Australian citizens.
- 3. More refugees who are now residing in Australia should be included in the permanent visas process announced by Andrew Giles on February 13 2023

Neil has penned his family's story of fortitude and hope, A Plight Without End, supported by Rural Australians for Refugees, and has also written an eBook, Smiles for Masks.

This did not happen (obviously) but the smile and joy of him hearing 'Midnight Man' is hopefully a sign of recovery.


My question is how did you deal with suddenly everyone looking for you as a point of strength, I have gone from looking after myself and being self-absorbed with everyday life to suddenly my whole family looking to me for guidance through this difficult time. I am only a week into this but feel so emotionally drained that I will just implode.

Any tips appreciated. Zack, Leeds, UK

I am sorry to hear about your going through a challenging time,

but I have found that embedded within these challenges there is almost always the opportunity for renewal or transformation. That is the plain but uncomfortable truth. I say this with a much conflicted heart, but it seems clear to me that the heartbreaks that routinely befall us - personally, societally or universally - are, in fact, the necessary gifts of change. These painful upheavals always provide us with the option for self-destruction or for transcendence. Heartbreak can be the engine of obliteration or growth. The choice is ours.

You are being called to remake yourself, to not be the self-absorbed individual you were. You are the one your family are depending upon for guidance, and although this can feel overwhelming and an almost impossible - perhaps even thankless -task, it will be a defining experience father's stroke, and that you are for you. True growth comes when we accept the mantle of that which we

feel is beyond us. If you can grasp it, Zack, and stay steady under the weight of the expectations placed upon you, you'll be able to look back on this, not just as someone who made things better for your father and your family, but from the perspective of a version of yourself you never knew was possible.

as I do to you, but being looked for guidance is a privilege uncomfortable, baffling and sometimes overwhelming, but a privilege just the same. We are all being called forth in the service of something.


# ST MARY OF THE CROSS MACKILLOP FEAST DAY


Each year on the 8th of August we celebrate the Solemnity of Saint Mary of the Cross MacKillop, Australia's beloved first saint.

On this day, we celebrate the important role she played in making education accessible for children in our country. Mary MacKillop devoted her life to ensuring a holistic Catholic education for children from rural, poor families.

St Mary MacKillop's impact on Australian education was remarkable. She was a trailblazer and a leader who passionately advocated for the education of underprivileged children and children in remote areas where others either would or could not go. For such children and their families, Mary opened a door of hope into the future.

Mary MacKillop was born in 1842 in Fitzroy, Melbourne. On 8 August 1909, she died, having suffered a disabling stroke in 1902. Inspired by a meeting with Fr. Julian Tenison-Woods, Mary MacKillop took her vows at the age of twenty five, and the religious name, "Mary





of the Cross". In doing so, she founded the congregation of the Sisters of St Joseph. Soon after taking her religious vows, Mary MacKillop founded several schools. Within five years of taking her vows and founding the Congregation of the Sisters of Saint Joseph, Mary had established over thirty schools in South Australia. By that time, more than one hundred women had joined the Sisters of Saint Joseph.

Mary MacKillop was very conscious of the plight of the poor and needy. She worked with families that lived in isolated areas of Australia. As a result, Mary MacKillop pioneered a new form of religious life in Australia, and commenced a "system" of "Josephite" schools that would provide education, especially for the children of the poor. In 1873, Pope Pius IX gave Papal approval

for the Congregation of the Sisters of Saint Joseph.

Even today, many Australians can say that they too have felt the impact of the enormous work started by St. Mary of the Cross (MacKillop), having been educated or cared for, by the Sisters of Saint Joseph. She was noted for her trust in the providence of God and miracles of healing have been attributed to her. She was declared a Saint by Pope Benedict XVI on the 17th October 2010. In January 2013, St Mary of the Cross (MacKillop) was declared by the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments, to be the Second Patron Saint of Australia. This means that Australia now has two Patron Saints: Mary Help of Christians and St. Mary of the Cross (MacKillop).

# **AUSTRALIAN POLITICIANS VISIT CARITAS PROGRAM** IN THE SOLOMON ISLANDS

A delegation of six Federal MPs and Senators travelled to the Solomon Islands to gain a first-hand experience of Australian aid in action.

Parliamentarians, including Mr David Smith MP and Hon Kevin Hogan MP, was able to witness how local communities are dealing with the impacts of inequality, climate change and natural disasters.

Vulnerable communities are still facing the consequences of Cyclone Harold, which hit the island in 2020, and the COVID-19 pandemic.

The San Isidro Care Centre and the DIVIT Rural Training Centre, with support from Caritas Australia Solomon Islands, have helped hundreds of people gain new skills through gender and disability inclusion, vocational training, and disaster risk reduction training workshops.

"Whena7.3 magnitude earthquake

The cross-party group of struck the Solomon Islands last year, one of the teachers who participated in Caritas Australia's program shared the success of the project, acknowledging that her students immediately knew how to respond," said Dennis Uba, Country Representative Solomon Islands Program, Caritas Australia.

> Although the Solomon Islands is a nation surrounded by water, it still experiences drought and water shortages. Around 40% of people in rural areas do not have access to basic drinking water, which can lead to the spread of communicable diseases like cholera and typhoid.

With support from Caritas Australia Solomon Islands, water tanks and rainwater harvesting systems were installed at the San Isidro School and the DIVIT

Rural Training Centre to improve sanitation and food security for local communities for many years to

"This is a great opportunity for politicians to develop a deeper understanding of the situation in the Pacific Islands, as well as for local communities to exchange knowledge and experience on key issues affecting their livelihoods."

The trip was part of the Australian Regional Leadership

Initiative delivered by Save the Children Australia in collaboration with the office of the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) and other NGOs.



# **COST-OF-LIVING RELIEF FOR** THOSE WHO NEED IT MOST

Catholic Social Services Australia (CSSA) welcomes the passage through Parliament of the Social Services and Other Legislation Amendment (Strengthening the Safety Net) Act 2023, which will provide targeted cost-of-living relief to around 2 million Australians that need it most.

CSSA, and other key advocates, have long highlighted the inadequacy of social security payments and the urgent need to raise these payments to at least \$76 a day, which would meet the poverty line.

From 20 September, the base rates for JobSeeker Payment, Youth Allowance, Parenting Payment (Partner), Austudy, ABSTUDY Living Allowance, Disability Support Pension (Youth), and Special Benefit will increase by \$40 per fortnight.

Additionally, indexation will be applied to some payments that were not previously indexed, including the JobSeeker Payment. JobSeeker Payment will be increased by a further \$16 per fortnight, taking it to an additional \$56 per fortnight from 20 September.

The Commonwealth Rent Assistance maximum rates will also increase by 15%, with around 1.1 million households better off by, on average, \$24 per fortnight.

The Interim Economic Inclusion Advisory Committee report, which brought together social security academic experts, business peak bodies, advocacy organisations, and

recommended Jobseeker Payment and related working-age payments as a priority.

Minister for Social Services Amanda Rishworth said, "These changes would benefit close to two million Australians, including 580,000 women, 318,000 young people (under 25), 150,000 First Nations Australians, and 245,000 mature-aged Australians.

Monique Earsman, Executive Director of CSSA, said, "This is very good news for Australians trapped in a cycle of disadvantage; we hope it relieves some of the pressure they are facing. We call upon the Government to continually review their response, listen to the experts and work towards a providing a payment that helps people escape poverty."



# ULURU STATEMENT FROM THE HEART

The ErinEarth Board of Directors unanimously voted to accept the invitation from our First Nations sisters and brothers to walk with them in a movement of the Australian people for a better future.

# This invitation is in the Uluru Statement from The Heart.

The wording of the motion that was carried is: 'That ErinEarth Ltd Board take on an active role in advocating for the adoption of the Uluru Statement in the Australian Constitution'.

The passing of this motion has implications for Board members only and does not oblige any staff members or other volunteers to have the same view. Board members recognise that it is the right and obligation of every Australian to educate themselves about what the Statement is asking for, and what the Referendum is asking us to agree or disagree with.

Some of the reasons for Board members coming to this decision are:

• The oldest continuous culture in

the world (at least 65,000 years) deserves recognition in our country's constitution. It is the only civilisation to survive the Ice Age. It is something of which every Australian should be proud of.

- There is a generosity in the statement, an invitation to join a shared story. It shouldn't be the responsibility of 3% of the population (First Nations Peoples) to educate 97% of the population.
- The statement doesn't call for separation of Australians. They are seeking acknowledgement.
- We have been walking apart for 250 years. Surely it is time to walk together. First Nations Peoples are asking us to walk with them.



- It is an opportunity for all Australians to Dare to be more than we are today. For 250 years, the First Nations Peoples have been told by the rest of us what is best for them, what they need. It is time to seriously listen to them now as to what they think their needs are.
- The Government's (both Labor and Coalition) failed efforts to 'Close the Gap' over 17 years is proof a new answer or way of doing things is needed.
- The Presentation Sisters have a long history of working for social justice issues, for supporting those most vulnerable and in need in our society. Board members see our decision as supporting that long commitment, a commitment that goes way back to Nano Nagle's work in Ireland hundreds of years ago.

Accepting the invitation of the Uluru Statement is not a party-political matter, although there are some who are trying to make it so. The Statement isn't addressed to politicians. It is addressed to the Australian people. The only political involvement should be putting in place the mechanism for the referendum to be held. Once this is done, it is up to each of us individually to accept the invitation, or

not.

As I have said, this is the position of the Directors of ErinEarth and is not binding on anyone else involved in ErinEarth. However I do urge each member of the ErinEarth family to give this moment in history serious thought and to make every effort to understand the issues involved. "If you don't know vote no" is a catchery of some in the community and is a terrible abrogation of our responsibility to make sure each of us make an informed decision.

# BUILDING RELIGIOUS LITERACY DURING

VOCATIONS AWARENESS WEEK 2023

How do you explain the vocation of religious life to young people in a secularised culture like Australia?

One resource that can assist is Our Stories, Our Lives, Our Mission: Catholic Religious in Australia, a new bookvby Catholic Religious Australia (CRA) and St Pauls Publications, launched on 3 August 2023 at the National Assembly.

A year in the making, the idea for the book arose as CRA's response to World Day for Consecrated Life, celebrated by the global Catholic Church on 2 February each year.

CRA President, Peter Jones OSA, commented, "On this day, the Church celebrates our way of life as integral to the life of the whole ecclesial community. Our Stories, Our Lives, Our Mission provides a tool for connecting the stories of religious congregations with the teaching agenda of schools and the formation of the young. It offers a kaleidoscope of fascinating insights into religious life, be it the education of children in outback Australia or an ecological ministry of the twentyfirst century, a Sister's 19th century shipboard diary, or the artistic symbolism of a religious insignia."

In 136 pages — along with a digital version and accompanying online teacher notes — over 60 Catholic Religious Institutes and Societies of Apostolic Life in Australia provide a compact two-page insight into their charisms, gifts and ministries.

Each congregation identifies its founder, historic turning points, notable writings, quotations of interest, as well as the meaning of its insignia. An accompanying 500-word story then elaborates on an historical aspect, often the founding story or the congregation's beginnings in Australia. Links in the online version take the student to relevant congregational web pages and the free online Glossary that accompanies the book explains over 200 Catholic terms in a brief sentence or two.

Anne Walker, CRA National Executive Director explains, "If a teacher, parent or youth minister is seeking to awaken Generation Z or Alpha to the beauty of religious life as a sister, brother, or religious priest, then this resource provides a valuable starting point. Having parented children through their school years of religion assignments, I wish I had a copy of this publication for its accessibility, information and heart!"

Anne continued, "The significance of this resource is that, in affirming the gift of religious life, it's also sowing seeds of learning and insight for a new generation of Catholics. The resilience of Religious from their beginnings in Australia to now, is made clear."

Our Stories Our Lives Our Mission— Catholic Religious in Australia includes a short history of Catholic Religious Australia as well as a Foreword by Fr Richard Lennan, Professor of Systematic Theology in the School of Theology and Ministry, Boston College, USA

This resource can be purchased as a printed book from the website of St Pauls Publications with further information online at Catholic Religious Australia.

The image of the kaleidoscope chosen for the cover design illustrates elements of "Religious life", which explodes with differences according to the creative energies of each founder and his/her founding partnerships reflecting different historical periods, societal needs, ethnicities, cultures and personalities. Meanwhile, the charisms and paths of congregations continually intersect and interweave; now separating, now converging; now expanding, now contracting; responsive to new circumstances and the Spirit's lead, all joining through their prophetic voice.

# MATER DEI CATHOLIC COLLEGE GIRLS IN STEM HIGH TEA A SUCCESS

Young ambitious students at Mater Dei Catholic School attended the Girls in STEM High Tea on Thursday, gaining vital insight into the various career pathways that are available to them after school.

The STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) program is in its second year and is held by the school, with organisers hoping to expand in the future.

Mater Dei Catholic College Leader of learning, digital technology and STEM Courtney Freebody said the event was attended by 32 mentors, as well as presenters from different STEM industries.

"The students and mentors work together on different challenges, we've also had different presenters talking to the girls about their journeys so that our girls get the experience of what the diversity is like with STEM," she said.

Ms Freebody was made aware of the staggering low statistics of female students engaging in STEM subjects in years 11 and 12 across the state, and further research showed a similar trend at the school

"Our female students are tending not to choose those subjects. When I looked at that I thought well how can we open up those doors so the girls could not be afraid to choose those subjects," she said.

"I wanted them to connect with someone who could give them insights into those STEM career pathways that weren't a teacher."

Attending the program has been game-changing for some students like year nine student Naha Jissoy who said the program has given her the push she needed to choose chemistry as one of her electives

"It's been good, I didn't know how many jobs there were," she said.

"I had thought STEM was just scientists and mathematicians."

Fellow year nine student Gypsy McDonnell said the day was an eye-opener to all of the STEM careers pathways there are.

"One girl said she wasn't good at maths and now she's an engineer," she said.

Natasha Lajdes, also a year nine student, said it was empowering to meet all of the women who have been successful in their roles.

"It's guided me to see that not all jobs are difficult for women to attain in male-dominated fields," she said.

"I loved hearing from those who said they had built themselves up from minimum wages to now being in super successful careers."

Architect and business owner Gioia Gianniotis was among the presenters at the event who said she wanted to do something about the declining numbers.

"Over the years I have seen the numbers aren't changing, we're not seeing as many women taking up the kind of roles within STEM," she said.

"They need to be able to see the potential of so many different careers."

# **FAMILY REFLECTIONS**

20th August - Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle A

Even when spurned by Jesus, the faith of the Canaanite woman makes her bold enough to argue and ask again for what she needs. Her persistence and great confidence that Jesus could heal her daughter reminds us of the confidence with which our children bring to us their own needs. In their faith and trust we can find modern examples of how we might approach God in prayer.

As a family recall some times when a request for something was presented by one family member to another with confidence and persistence. If the request was denied, talk about why that was so. If the request was eventually granted, talk about what led to the change of heart. Then read together today's Gospel, Matthew 15:21-28. Was anyone surprised by Jesus' response to the Canaanite woman? Why or why not? What makes Jesus change his mind and heal the woman's daughter? When we pray, God wants us to be as confident in his mercy.

Invite family members to identify the things that they most need from God. Pray these prayers of petition together as a family, confident that God will hear and answer your prayers.

Isaiah 56:1.6-7 Psalm 67:2-3.5-6.8 Romans 11:13-15,29-32 Matthew 15:21-28

#### 27th August - Twenty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle A

Today's Gospel reminds us that the Church is built on the foundation of faith in Jesus Christ. Peter announces the core of our faith, that Jesus is God's only Son. The family, as the domestic church, has this same faith as its foundation.

As you gather together as a family, talk about people whose faith has helped you to be a member of the Church and talk about what you have learned from leaders in our Church today. Read together today's Gospel, Matthew 16:13-20. Talk about what you know about Peter and his importance to the early Christian community. Talk about what we can learn from Peter and his profession of faith about Jesus. Conclude in prayer together by praying today's Psalm or an Act of Faith.

> Isaiah 22:19-23 Psalm 138:1-3.6.8 Romans 11:33-36 Matthew 16:13-20

#### 3rd September - Twenty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle A

Peter was expecting a Messiah that would carry out a different plan than the one Jesus had explained. Jesus was indeed the Messiah, but his life and death would show a different understanding of what it means to be the Messiah. We too have expectations of God and our own ideas about what we think God ought to be doing in our world. Like Peter we may risk limiting our image of God by thinking only in human ways. God's plan is always more than

As you gather as a family, talk about what we expect God to be doing in our world and in our family life. Then read today's Gospel, Matthew 16:21-27. Why do you think Peter was so upset by what Jesus was saying? Notice how Jesus reprimands Peter. Do we sometimes forget to let God be God for us? That is, do we sometimes get discouraged because God doesn't act in our world in the ways that we expect? Pray together that your family will remember that God is always working for the world's salvation in ways

that are beyond our human imaginings. Conclude by praying together today's Psalm, Psalm 63.

#### 10th September - Twenty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle A

As you gather as a family this week, discuss the procedures for resolving disputes in your family. What kinds of things produce disagreements in your family? Do children frequently request the assistance of the adults when a disagreement arises? How do the adults respond? In today's Gospel, Jesus teaches his disciples the way in which they are to handle conflict within the Christian community of the Church. Read together this Gospel, Matthew 18:15-20. Invite family members to summarize the steps that Jesus proposes for resolving conflict. How might today's Gospel inform your family's handling of disagreements? If you have time, your family might choose to role play how Jesus' teaching about conflict resolution might be applied to a disagreement that sometimes occurs in your household.

In today's Gospel, Jesus also promises that he will help those who pray to him with their needs. Pray together that each member of your family will learn to handle conflict in a Christian manner. Pray together the Peace Prayer of Saint Francis

# We now know the location for the next World Youth Day: **Seoul, South Korea**

# The announcement was made on 6 August at the end of A fa

The announcement was made on 6 August at the end of the Missioning Mass, presided over by Pope Francis and concelebrated by thousands of priests.

Archbishop Peter Chung Soon-taick of Seoul revealed in an interview that the Asian country is facing a major challenge in relation to the dwindling number of young people in 2022. According to official statistics, the nation has the lowest birth rate in the world, with only 0.8 children per couple. Because of this, the number of young people in churches has also decreased.

So WYD "could become an excellent opportunity to bring young people together around a project that makes them protagonists. It would start a process and, once it is completed, it would be good to share with everyone what we have experienced. It would be a missionary opportunity to share the values of the Gospel in our society," he concluded.

Even so, the number of Catholics in South Korea has increased by 50 per cent in the last twenty years. In that time, the percentage of Catholics in the country has gone from 8.3 per cent to 11.1 per cent, reaching more than 6 million Catholics. A fact to be noted is the peculiarity of the beginning of the Catholic faith: its establishment and dissemination were developed in Korea on the initiative of the people, simple people, and not by priests or missionaries. The scholars, coming into contact with religious books from the West, understooad and accepted Catholicism as a religion, not as a study or literature, realising that the sacraments could only be administered by priests. Thus, the Catholic community began to cross the borders with China to bring priests to Korea, even at the risk of death.

May World Youth Day in Korea be an event of grace and hope for young people in Asia and around the world.

Before announcing the location of the next WYD, Francis also invited young people from all over the world to participate in the Jubilee of Youth, which will take place in Rome in 2025: "I count on your presence in 2025 to celebrate together

"I count on your presence in 2025 to celebrate together the Jubilee of Young people".
