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# Evangelisation by me?

#### Arousing faith is а wonderful experience.

A friend told me of a time she was with a group of Year 8 students in a secular context. The talk got around to God and, almost as a thought experiment, my friend asked the students what difference it would make to them if God was real. "I wouldn't have to worry" replied one. "I would have peace" said another. Then the penny dropped and they looked at her and asked: "You don't believe that God is real, do you?" Not only had these young people not met God, they had not met anyone that they knew believed in God. And this gave my friend a chance to share with them what her life with God is like.

This is one example of what evangelisation. Evangelisation is no more than making Jesus known and loved. It is not a word or action we need to be uncomfortable with.

All the Easter texts culminate in the Risen One's sending of the disciples. Matthew says: "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all the nations." "Go into the world and proclaim the good news to the whole of creation," says Mark. "Repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things," reads Luke. In John we find: "As the Father has sent me, so am I sending you."

Paul understands that Jesus appeared to him that "so that I might proclaim him among the Gentiles." (Gal 1: 15-16) I believe that God has made Himself known to us so that you and I can love him and can to say and in whether it should be said. We

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share him with others. Your and my personal mission is inseparable from the building of the Kingdom.

St Paul VI says: "Modern man listens more willingly to witnesses than to teachers, and if he does listen to teachers, it is because they are witnesses." (Evangelii Nuntiandi 41) This is not an invitation to say less but to be authentic, to live what we do say.

have become unsure of ourselves and thus speak less and less powerfully making it harder to distinguish us from the wider culture. "Beige Catholicism" won't attract the world to Christ, however.

Can I invite you to prepare a 3-minute version and a 15-minute version of your conversion story/personal encounter? In this way, you can be ready to explain why

"I invite all Christians, everywhere, at this very moment, to a renewed personal encounter with Jesus Christ, or at least an openness to letting him encounter them; I ask all of you to do this unfailing each day. No one should think that this invitation is not meant for him or her, since 'no one is excluded from the joy brought by the Lord."

Pope Francis (Evangelii Gaudium #3)

The Year 8 students wanted to know if my friend really believed what she said. Did she stake her life on it? Did it make a positive difference?

A fundamental of evangelisation is an extraordinarily deep and profound personal experience of God through, with and in Jesus Christ. Being Christian is not the result of an ethical or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction. (Deus Caritas Est, 1, Benedict XVI) Jesus takes the initiative and invites people to this personal encounter.

Some of us have lost confidence in what

are you am a Catholic and what Jesus means to you. In it, you might like to include your experience of where "Jesus Christ loves you; [where] he gave his life to save you; and now he is living at your side every day to enlighten, strengthen and free you" (Evangelii Gaudium 164).

# BISHOPS CONFERENCE AND CRA PUBLISH ROYAL COMMISSION UPDATE

The Australian Catholic Bishops Conference and Catholic Religious Australia have published a report updating the Church's progress in implementing the relevant recommendations of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse.

On the 5 year anniversary of the initial response, the report is part of the Church's ongoing efforts to be publicly accountable for how it is working to create, maintain and enhance safe environments for children and all people who are at risk.

Following the format of the initial response, the new report lists each relevant Royal Commission recommendation, the response that was given in 2018 and a high-level summary of work undertaken in the five years since.

The presidents of CRA and the Bishops Conference, in the report's preamble, draw on the words of Pope Francis, who said each member of the Church "is called to assume responsibility for preventing cases of abuse and to work for justice and for healing".

"It is to this responsibility that we commit the ACBC and CRA anew, and to which we call all Catholics in Australia, as we give this account of actions taken to implement the recommendations of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse," write Archbishop Timothy Costelloe SDB and Fr Peter Jones OSA in the report.

"It remains our hope and prayer that all that we have done, are doing and will do, may help to bring healing to those so gravely harmed when in the Church's care."

In each of the past five years, the Bishops Conference and CRA have submitted annual reports on the Church's initiatives, prepared with guidance from the National Office for Child Safety.

Fr Jones and Archbishop Costelloe note that the past five years have been a period of ongoing listening and learning, and a time for the development of additional practices, policies and procedures.

"We understand more fully that our institutions become 'child-serving' when they live up to the values and beliefs that enshrine the inherent right of all children to safety, nurture and care," they write.


"We know too all aspects of our Catholic organisations need to be attuned and responsive to the vulnerability of children and adults at risk."

The five-year update outlines some key milestones since the 2018 report, including:



AUGUST 2023

- implementation of the National Catholic Safeguarding Standards, now in a second edition;
- establishment of Australian Catholic Safeguarding Limited;
- development of the National Response Framework and related National Response Protocol;
- preparation of new programs for priestly and religious formation; and

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## SYNOD ON SYNODALITY 'TRULY IMPORTANT' DESPITE BEING 'OF LITTLE INTEREST TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC'

Pope Francis acknowledged that the upcoming Synod on Synodality may be "of little interest to the general public" but underlined that the synod is "truly important" for the Catholic Church.

"I am well aware that speaking of a 'Synod on Synodality' may seem something abstruse, selfreferential, excessively technical, and of little interest to the general public," Pope Francis said on Aug. 26.

"But what has happened over the past year, which will continue with the assembly next October and then with the second stage of Synod 2024, is something truly important for the Church."

The pope spoke about the significance of the synod nearly one month ahead of the first global Synod on Synodality assembly taking place at the Vatican Oct. 4–28.

suggestions. We want to contribute together to build the Church where everyone feels at home, where no one is excluded," Pope Francis said.

"That word of the Gospel that is so important: everyone. Everyone, everyone: There are no first-, secondor third-class Catholics, no. All together. Everyone. It is the Lord's invitation."

The pope underlined that the Church needs to "get used to listening to each other, to talking, not cutting our heads off for a word" and "to listen and discuss in a mature way."

"This is a grace we all need in order to move forward. And it is something the Church today offers the world, a

It is the first of two assemblies that culminate the Church's multiyear, worldwide undertaking during which Catholics were asked to submit feedback at diocesan, national, and continental levels.

"We have opened our doors, we have offered everyone the opportunity to participate, we have taken into account everyone's needs and world so often so incapable of making decisions, even when our very survival is at stake," he said.

"We are trying to learn a new way of living relationships, listening to one another to hear and follow the voice of the Spirit."

To explain the significance of the Synod on Synodality, Pope Francis described the synod as "a journey

that St. Paul VI began at the end of the [Vatican II] Council when he created the Secretariat of the Synod of Bishops because he had realized that in the Western Church synodality had disappeared, whereas in the Eastern Church they have this dimension."

"And this yearslong journey — 60 years — is bearing great fruit," he added.

Pope Francis spoke about the upcoming synod while accepting an award from Italian journalists at the Vatican's Apostolic Palace, noting that he usually declines awards and honors.

"You must know that, even before becoming bishop of Rome, I used to decline the offer of awards. I never received any, I did not want to. And I have continued to do so even as pope. There is, however, one reason that prompted me to accept yours, and that is the urgency of constructive communication, which fosters the culture of encounter and not of confrontation; the culture of peace and not of war; the culture of openness to the other and not of prejudice," he said.

"Disinformation is one of the sins of journalism," he added while enumerating other "journalistic sins," including slander, defamation, and a "love of scandal."

"We need to spread a culture of encounter, a culture of dialogue, a culture of listening to the other and his or her reasons," he said. "Digital culture has brought us so many new possibilities for exchange, but it also risks turning communication into slogans."

Pope Francis also met with a delegation of Catholic legislators on Saturday who are taking part in a meeting on the topic of "Great Power Struggle, Corporate Capture, and Technocracy: A Christian Answer to Dehumanizing Trends."

The International Catholic Legislators Network is a group of Catholic parliamentarians from around the world that holds an annual private meeting in Rome.

The group, founded in 2010 by the Austrian Cardinal Christoph Schönborn and David Alton, a member of Britain's House of Lords, is dedicated to religious liberty, Churchstate relations, the protection of life, and communicating Catholic thought in secular politics.

Pope Francis spoke to the lawmakers about how "today's dominant technocratic paradigm raises profound questions about the place of human beings and of human action in the world."

"Surely one of the most concerning aspects of this paradigm, with its negative impact upon both human and natural ecology alike, is its subtle seduction of the human spirit, lulling people — and especially the young into misusing their freedom," the pope said.

He encouraged the lawmakers to continue to promote Catholic social teaching, "especially the centrality of the God-given value and dignity of every human person."

"I pray that the Holy Spirit will inspire and guide your efforts to form a new generation of welleducated and faithful Catholic leaders committed to promoting the Church's social and ethical teachings in the public sphere. In this way, you will surely contribute to the building up of God's kingdom," he said.

# **GIVING UP ON FEAR**

A friend of mine shares this story. He was an only child. When he was in his late twenties, still single, building a successful career and living in the same city as his mother and father, his father died, leaving his mother widowed.

His mother, who had centered her life on her family and on her son, was understandably devastated. Much of her world collapsed, she'd lost her husband, but she still had her son.

The next years were not always easy for her son. His mother had lost much of her world, save him, and he felt a heavy responsibility toward her. She lived for his visits. His days off and his vacation times had to be spent with her. Much as he loved his mother, it was a burden that prevented him from having the social life and relational freedom he yearned for, and it prevented him from making some career decisions that he would otherwise have made. He had to take care of his mother, to be there for her. As one can guess, their times together were sometimes a test of loyalty and duty for the son. But he did it faithfully, year after year. There was no one else his mother could lean on.

When his mother's health began to decline, she sold her house and moved into a Seniors' complex. Most times on his day off he would pick up his mother, take her for a drive in the country, and then take her to dinner before dropping her back at her mini apartment. One day on such an outing, driving along a country road in silence, his mother broke the quiet with words that both surprised him and, for the first time in a long time, had his full attention.

She shared words to this effect: Something huge has happened in my life. I've given up on fear. All my life I have been afraid of everything - of not measuring up, of not being good enough, of being boring, of being excluded, of being alone, of ending up alone, of ending up without any money or a place to live, of people talking about me behind my back. I've been afraid of my own shadow. Well, I've given up on fear. And why not? I've lost everything - my husband, my place in society, my home, my physical looks, my health, my teeth, and my dignity. I've nothing left to lose anymore, and do you know something? It's good! I'm not afraid of anything anymore. I feel free in a way I have never felt before. I've given up on fear.

For the first time in a long time, he began to listen closely to what his mother was saying. He also sensed something new in her, a new strength and a deeper wisdom from which he wished to drink. The next time he took her for a drive, he said to her: Mom. teach me that. Teach me how not to be afraid.

She lived for two more years and during those years he took her for drives in the country and for lunches and dinners together, and he drew




something from her, from that new strength in her, that he had not been able to draw from before. When she eventually died and he lost her earthly presence, he could only describe what she had given him in those final years by using biblical terms: "My mother gave me birth twice, once from below and once from above."

It's not easy to give up on fear, nor to teach others how to do so. Fear has such a grip on us because for most of our lives we in fact have much to lose. So, it's hard, understandably so, not to live with a lot of fear for most of our lives. Moreover, this is not a question of being mature or immature, spiritual or earthy. Indeed, sometimes the more mature and spiritual we are, the more we appreciate the preciousness of life, of health, of family, of friendship, of community - all of which have their own fragility and all of which we can

lose. There are good reasons to be afraid.

It is no accident that this man's mother was able to move beyond fear only after she had lost most everything in life. God and nature recognize that and have written it into the aging process. The aging process is calibrated to take us to a place where we can give up on fear because as we age and lose more and more of our health, our importance in the world, our physical attractiveness, our loved ones to death, and our dignity, we have less and less to lose - and less and less to be afraid of.

This is one of nature's last gifts to us, and living in a way that others see this new freedom in us can also be one of the last great gifts we leave behind with those we love.

The launch coincides with the Season of Creation, a worldwide, ecumenical movement that celebrates God's gift of our common home. This year, the theme is 'Let Justice and Peace Flow'. Drawing on the river imagery described in Amos 5:24, it



challenges us to act for ecological justice, creating change and speaking out with communities most impacted by rising sea levels, biodiversity losses and other consequences of climate injustice.

# **'HOUSE OF MERCY': POPE FRANCIS HIGHLIGHTS MISSIONARY EFFORTS IN MONGOLIA**

September 4 was the final day of Pope Francis' Papal visit to Mongolia, which concluded with the blessing of the 'House of Mercy', a welcoming place dedicated to supporting people most in need.

A significant last stop for Pope Francis, that through this blessing, acknowledged the missionary effort on the ground as being more than evangelical, but people orientated for the greater good. As the House of Mercy is a tangible expression of the Church's care for others.

"These [charitable work] internally developed into long-term projects are carried out mostly by the various missionary institutes present here and much appreciated by the population and civil authorities. Indeed, government has sought help from Catholic missionaries in confronting the numerous social emergencies," highlighted Pope Francis in his speech.

Supported by Catholic Mission, the House of Mercy is a social centre that will provide support for women and minors who are victims of domestic violence, a safe place for people suffering from homelessness, and a welcoming place for migrants. The international charitable effort and the dedication of missionaries on the ground are an enormous source of support for the House of Mercy.

"Those projects continue to draw upon the dedication of missionaries from many countries who put their knowledge, experience, resources and especially their love at the service of Mongolian Society. To them, and to all those who support these many good works, I express my appreciation and offer my heartfelt thanks," continued Pope Francis.

However, key to the project is the involvement of the local Church as the main leader of the project, supported by missionaries and charitable organisations, a unique collaboration at the heart of the Pontifical Mission Societies (known as Catholic Mission in Australia). It enables the communities to develop themselves with adequate support, a work process that was highlighted as being an example of community collaboration by Pope Francis:



"The House of Mercy is meant to be the point of reference for a variety of charitable works, hands outstretched towards our brothers and sisters, struggling to navigate life's problems. A safe haven, in other words, where people can find a listening ear and an understanding heart. While, not unlike many other initiatives supported by there's Catholic institutions, this new undertaking is also special, since here it is the particular Church that carries out the work. Coordinating the efforts of all the missionary groups, while preserving a clearly local identity as an authentic expression of the Apostolic Prefecture as a whole."

The House of Mercy is a project pursued by Catholic Mission, which works relentlessly to give a voice and empower communities worldwide by giving them adequate support to succeed in addressing grassroots issues.

"It is an immense honor to have welcomed the Holy Father within the House of Mercy, and to have blessed the place. This place is a witness of the missionary work here in Mongolia, but also from around the world, as highlighted by Pope Francis in his speech earlier today," said Lawrence Gigliotti, Catholic Mission Program Manager, responsible for the collaboration between Catholic Mission and the local Church for the House of Mercy.

## BISHOPS' STATEMENT CALLS FOR 'NEW ENGAGEMENT' WITH FIRST PEOPLES

Australia's Catholic Bishops have called on the nation to seek "a new engagement" with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in their annual Social Justice Statement launched on August 17.

Since the 1940s, the bishops have published annual statements that urge the Catholic community to reflect and act on social, economic and ecological issues. The statements are published as a focal point for Social Justice Sunday, which will be marked on August 27 this year.

This year's statement, *Listen, Learn, Love: A New Engagement with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples,* was launched in Western Sydney by Bishop Vincent Long OFM Conv, chair of the Bishops Commission for Social Justice, Mission and Service.

"One of the objectives of this statement is that we want Catholics to understand that Catholic social teaching and Catholic social action are not simply theoretical and academic exercises," he said.

"We hear what God is saying to us about justice by being with our sisters and brothers on the peripheries of society."

While the Social Justice Statement is a teaching document of the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference, a large part of this year's statement was written by members of the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council. It is part of the message's exhortation to "listen".


"Listening is hard. Hearing about young people taking their lives, about so many people ending up in jail, of children still being taken away from their parents and grandparents and about the ongoing racism is tough," Bishop Long said.

"It must be so much more difficult for these people to tell us about their painful experiences. We are deeply grateful to those who shared their stories of pain with us."

The theme for this year's statement was chosen in May 2022, well before the Voice to Parliament referendum was mooted and before the timing of a vote was proposed. While the bishops don't suggest how people should vote, Bishop Long said "whatever the outcome of this year's referendum, we ask the Church in Australia to make efforts to lead the way for our fellow Australians" in pursuing reconciliation.

"Our attitudes and actions towards First Nations Peoples need to be grounded in justice, love and humility," he said.

"We need to listen with deep respect and learn from them about what needs to be done to improve



their situations. We need to walk with them, day by day, and work with them to bring about change for the better – for their people and for all of us.

"Strengthening our relationship with our First Peoples is integral and indeed critical to the strengthening of the whole nation." Access the statement at: https://bit.ly/SJS2023-24

Then 25 years ago, recognising the seriousness of our planet's situation, the Sisters shone the lantern on a corner of the Mt Erin site. With community support they transformed



# CELIBACY A GIFT THAT 'FULFILS' PRIESTS

It might "go against the grain" outside the church but Renee Kohler-Ryan insists there is a strong case for Catholic priests to stay celibate.

As national head of the School of Philosophy and Theology at Notre Dame University Australia, she teaches young men who aspire to a life in the priesthood with all the worldly sacrifices that entails.

Yet there's another side rarely brought out: what they gain in the process.

"Spiritually speaking, they're really married to the church," Professor Kohler-Ryan said.

"They're giving their whole lives to this vocation and I think we're not good enough, generous enough, as a society in realising what a special relationship it is.

"To be a priest is to be serving and giving one's whole life like Christ gave his whole life. So that's what I see in these young men ... there isn't a sense of loss for what they are forgoing, it's more a sense of fulfilment."

This discussion is replete with nuance and counter-intuitive turns. If the five million Australians who identify as being Catholic, without necessarily attending mass, are part of a universal church, there are striking differences in the recruitment rate of new priests across the country.

Take Sydney, where Professor Kohler-Ryan lives and works: the Seminary of the Good Shepherd at Homebush inducted 17 trainees this year in one of the biggest intakes for years, attesting to the strength of the local archdiocese.

In Brisbane, however, the graduating class of 2023 from the Holy Spirit Seminary profiled in the current edition of The Weekend Australian Magazine numbered three.

As Professor Kohler-Ryan noted: "I think the numbers in Sydney give cause for hope. I saw analysis in the last few days of census data showing that in Sydney ... we have pretty high rates of young people who are highly engaged with their faith ... but I know in other areas of the country the situation is quite dire.

"Overall, it really does look like we're not replacing priests at the levels we would need to sustain the parish levels we have right now."

A practising Catholic, she is a member of the nine-strong Australian contingent to attend a potentially watershed summit on the future of

the church in Rome this October. This Synod on Synodality will examine priestly celibacy alongside other hotbutton issues for Catholics such as women in the clergy and outreach to the LGBTQ+ community.

While the number of seminarians undertaking the testing seven years of training has stabilised nationally at 304 as of 2021, the cohort of priests in Australia is 2900, down from a peak of 3895 in 1971.

Catholic Archbishop of Brisbane Mark Coleridge has said the existing model of a "priest in every parish" was unsustainable and has flagged an eventual phasing out of compulsory celibacy as "very likely" and there was a "glimmer of a possibility" that women could be ordained as deacons at entry-level in the clergy. Professor Kohler-Ryan had reservations on both options. Opening the Catholic deaconate to women could prove "confusing" given it would raise the question of why they couldn't become priests.

"I know this is something that not everyone – and certainly not every woman – would agree on but I think it's theologically significant that Christ became human and became male," she said.

"It's not something we can brush over."

Professor Kohler-Ryan acknowledged that priestly celibacy was a "church discipline matter" rather than doctrine, given there was no mention of it in the Bible.



# MACE SISTERS COMPLETE FIRST GENERAL CHAPTER

The MACE Sisters who work in the Wagga Wagga Diocese have recently finished their first General Chapter which was held in a city a few hours north of Manila.

## A General Chapter, usually held every six years, is a key moment for a a religious group in the Church.

During the Chapter they renewed themselves in their charism and made decisions about how it could be applied even more faithfully.

They also held elections for Superior General and her Council. The new General is Sr Lydia Paola Marave who, until this time, had been working in the Philippines. Sr Angelita G. Marave, who was the previous Superior General was appointed her Vicar. Two of the Sisters, stationed in Australia, were also elected to the Council: Sr Asuncion Lorenzo and Sr Leticia Bontigao.

# SUDAN CRISIS CONTINUES LEAVING MILLIONS OF PEOPLE VULNERABLE

After months of protracted fighting, violence in Sudan continues to spread across the country causing millions to flee their homes.

The ongoing conflict has put pressure on already scarce resources, with many people facing a lack of water, sanitation, food, shelter and safety, resulting in an urgent need for humanitarian assistance for people displaced within Sudan and in neighbouring countries.

Armed clashes began in April 2023 and as violence spread, more than three million people have been forced from their homes including over 350,000 children, with 24.7 million people now in dire need of humanitarian assistance.

More than 1,000 people have been killed, and over 12,000 injured

in the fighting with the impact felt by the most vulnerable. A staggering 75 percent of people affected by the conflict are women and children.

"With so many people forced from their homes and the rainy season approaching, immediate needs are growing fast. For a long time, Sudan has been a host for refugees from neighbouring countries, these refugees are now forced to uproot and flee once more."

"Important aid work has been happening in refugee camps for many years with limited resources. This new wave of conflict is pushing the country beyond breaking point", said Sally Thomas, Caritas Australia's

# SUPPORTING SISTERS IN PARAGUAY

The "Daughters of Mary, Help of Christians" belong to the religious family of the Salesians of Don Bosco and are devoted in particular to the education of young people.

12 sisters of this community currently live and work in the apostolic vicariate of Chaco in the far north of Paraguay. In fact, they not only care for the young people here but also support the families, visiting the sick and the elderly, bringing them Communion, giving catechetical instruction and supporting the poor and disadvantaged with practical help and advice.

This is a vast region, covering around 37,000 square miles (96,000 km<sup>2</sup>), similar in size to South Korea or a little larger than Hungary, yet at the same time only sparsely populated, with just 30,000 inhabitants. The roads are very poor, and many places can only be reached by water. These include the two remote and isolated communities under the care of Sister Blanca. The people in them belong to 2 different indigenous tribes, and in order to reach them Sister Blanca has to make a journey of 2 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> hours along the Paraguay River.

The other sisters also work in the town of Puerto Casado, where they care in particular for the members of the indigenous Maskoy people. "The grace of God has always accompanied the sisters of our community since they are instruments of the Gospel of Jesus Christ among the marginalised peoples of Puerto Casado and the Maskoy Indians – an impoverished ethnic group which is continuing to develop, thanks to the support of the Salesian brothers and sisters," explains Sister Marciana Toledo Vergara, the Superior of the community.

Sister Emilia works in five different indigenous communities, preparing the children for their First Holy Communion, caring for the sick and supporting the local teachers. She also supports the students of the Maskoy people and generally helps the indigenous peoples in their daily struggle for survival.



Meanwhile, Sister Justa works together with some of the committed laywomen of the parish, visiting the various suburbs of Puerto Casado. Sister Irene organises catechetical sessions and leisure activities for the children and young people and also guides a young people's group in the parish, helping to organise the liturgy and working to help the most needy.

In Ñu Apu'a the sisters have established a boarding school for 110 children whose families live too far from the nearest school. In this way, these children also have a chance to gain a proper school education.

These are just a few examples of the outstanding work the sisters are doing. They offer their service selflessly and for no reward, and so we in turn would like to support them for the current year with basic subsistence aid of 8000 AUD.





# VIRTUE MINISTRY AND THE APOSTOLIC SOUL

This September Virtue Ministry celebrates its 7th birthday. Were VM a person and not a ministry we would say that it has reached the 'age of reason.'

The age of reason is the term used to describe the period of human life where one is considered capable of discerning the difference between right and wrong, or good and evil. This transition into being considered morally responsible generally occurs around the age of seven.

But just because we're deemed capable of reasoning doesn't mean that we're actually reasonable. Without going into details from the human formation part of my life – my role as mother of 8 – I can readily attest to this. And it's not just the kids – mea culpa, mea culpa, mea maxima culpa!

Any process of growth – whether through age and experience or in the spiritual life - involves transition and it has been the same with VM. You might recall that earlier this year our founder and managing director announced a change to VM's direction. Maybe this announcement surprised you at the time. I mean, why change the direction to a focus on adult human formation after 6 years of active youth ministry?

The answer is as clear as mud: the soul of the apostolate dictated the change.

#### The Apostolate's Soul is Prayer

The practical works of the Virtue Ministry team are the tip of the proverbial iceberg. The courses and workshops – including the recent Seminary Formation Workshop, and the Wounds, Healing and Personal Mission Course currently underway in the Cathedral Parish – are but a small part of the overall apostolate of VM.

The real soul of the mission and ministry of this initiative – and all other apostolates – is prayer.

Without the firm foundation, the strong bedrock of prayer, there can be no success in any apostolate. For each hour spent actively speaking to, and with, course and workshop attendees, or recording podcast episodes, there have been more than a considerable number spent in prayer and contemplation by all members of the Virtue Ministry community and, in particular, the team itself.

Dom Jean-Baptiste Chautard's wonderful book *Soul of the Apostolate* explains succinctly why the focus of a ministry may change due to discernment in prayer, rather than the results of active outreach: "The life of action ought to flow from the contemplative life, to interpret and extend it, outside oneself, though at the same time being detached from it as little as possible."

### Soul Sisters

The tension – and link - between the contemplative and active life is portrayed in the Gospel account of Mary and Martha. Mary representing the contemplative life and Martha, the active life.

In this simple account of two sisters in Jesus' presence, and the parts they choose, contains a nugget of truth that continues to resonate: 'No matter how intense it may be, the active life has its limit here below. Preaching, teaching, works of every sort all come to an end at the threshold of eternity. But the interior life will never cease: "Which shall not be taken away from her."" (cf. Luke 10: 38-42)

Working harder in the active, or practical, aspects of any ministry, does not guarantee success. In fact, it may well result in the opposite. In order to work smarter in apostolate of any kind, we actually need to pray more.

"But above all, you will have to pay the price yourself, not so much by wearing yourself out rehearsing plays or getting up football games, as by storing up in yourself the life of prayer. For you can be sure that the extent to which you yourself are able to live on the love of Our Lord will be the exact measure of your ability to stir it up in other people."

### Your Soul Needs Unity too

Contemplation and action are not



just necessary for apostolates like Virtue Ministry. They are necessary for all of us individually.

"The union of the two lives, contemplative and active, constitutes the true apostolate, the chief work of Christianity" and this is a work that we are all called to by way of our Baptism.

If I want to improve myself it might appear best to go out and apply practical strategies that appear to be a sensible approach. And then I could toil on, indefinitely, without making any headway. But if I'm truly invested in increasing in virtue and becoming who I was created to be, then I can't just approach life in a haphazard way.

I need to start with prayer. I need to pray. Pray again. And again after that. I need to increase my time in contemplation with Jesus – in His Real Presence where possible and practical – and prayerfully discern where I need to apply my activity in an intentional way.

Then too, my sound reasoning in moral judgments will increase. Then too, I might advance upon the narrow way. "And so, in the soul of a saint, action and contemplation merge together in perfect harmony to give perfect unity to his life."

So, ask yourself: how can I make better use of contemplation to propel my action? How can I increase my own opportunities for prayer and discernment, and prioritise them over the need to feel productive?

Start simply. Start with meditating on the story of Martha and Mary in Saint Luke's Gospel and reconcile those soul sisters in your own life.

# FAMILY REFLECTIONS

#### 17th September

Twenty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle A Children learn to trust God's mercy and forgiveness when they experience forgiveness from those closest to them. We hope that we model God's love and forgiveness within our family life. Today's Gospel reminds us that forgiveness is measured by its quality more than its quantity.

Invite your family to consider some recent times when family members sought the forgiveness of another. Ask if there were any statements made that put conditions on our forgiveness such as "I will play this game with you if you apologize for knocking over my blocks" or "I will accept your apology after you clean up your room." Do we sometimes "keep count" or put conditions on our forgiveness of one another? This is something we may be doing without realizing it.

Read together today's Gospel, Matthew 18:21-35. Ask if we sometimes find ourselves sounding like Peter, concerning ourselves with quantity of forgiveness rather than offering forgiveness abundantly and unconditionally. Reflect upon the parable that Jesus tells. What does the servant do that makes the king so angry? He refuses to forgive his fellow servant the debt that he owes. Because we have all received God's forgiveness, God expects that we will also be forgiving toward others. Jesus' answer to Peter's question is found at the end of the parable. The number of times that we forgive one another is less important than the depth of our forgiveness. We must forgive one another from the heart.

Conclude in prayer together that God's love and forgiveness is evident in your family life. Pray together today's psalm, Psalm 103, or the Lord's Prayer.

Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle A The workers in this parable sound very much like squabbling children, comparing what they have each

#### been given and making complaints to the parent.

Among children there is a tendency to equate love with gifts and material things. This tendency can devolve into a spirit of entitlement, which runs counter to the spirit of gratitude. Any effort we make to overcome this tendency, to keep love from being entwined with gifts and possessions, will enable our children to accept completely the love that God gives freely and generously.

Observe together any tendency within your family to make comparisons. Are children sometimes heard saying that another child received a greater portion of a favorite food at dinner or dessert? Does one person complain that a parent spends more time with one child over another? Ask if such comparisons are helpful. Discuss together why such comparisons are made. Then read together today's Gospel, Matthew 20:1-16. Consider these questions: Why do the workers grumble? Is the landowner's assessment accurate? Unfortunately, we are sometimes like these workers when we make the comparisons we discussed earlier.

Conclude in prayer together remembering that love cannot and ought not to be measured. Sit quietly together acknowledging God's great love for each person as individuals and for your family. Pray together today's psalm, Psalm 145, or the Lord's Prayer.

Twenty-Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle A The example Jesus poses in today's Gospel could have been taken directly from family experience. Each of us can recall instances in which family members spoke one thing but then did another. The point of Jesus' story is to show that our actions speak louder than words, even with God.

As you gather as a family, talk about times when a family member said one thing and then did another. Acknowledge that sometimes the action taken displays a true change of heart. Then read today's Gospel, Matthew 21:28-32. Observe that Jesus faulted the religious leaders for not allowing John the Baptist's message of repentance to change their hearts and actions. The word we sometimes use for this change of heart is conversion. Jesus wants us to do more than pay lip service to the Gospel; he wants us to be transformed by his word.

Pray together that your family will experience a conversion to God and show evidence of this in both actions and words. Pray together today's second reading, Philippians 2:1-5.

Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time, Cycle A In an ideal household, family members know the rules and follow them consistently. Even the most conscientious among us, however, sometimes needs to be reminded of the rules and their importance. How we respond to such correction reveals our true character. In today's Gospel Jesus exposes the religious leaders for their failure to heed God's messengers. It is an opportunity for us to consider how we respond to those who are God's messengers today, calling us to correct our ways and return to the way of the Lord.

As you gather as a family, talk about some of the most important rules of your household. Consider how consistently family members follow these rules. How are family members reminded when rules are not being followed? How do they respond? In today's Gospel Jesus corrects the religious leaders through a parable telling them that they have not heeded God's messengers. Read Matthew 21:33-43. What are some of God's rules that we must follow? How do we respond to God's messengers today? Pray together as a family that you will heed God's messengers and follow God's ways. Pray together the Act of Contrition for the times when your family has not heeded God's word.

# **WORLD YOUTH DAY 2027**



## We now know the location for the next World Youth Day: Seoul, South Korea

#### The announcement was made on 6 August at the end of the Missioning Mass, presided over by Pope Francis and concelebrated by thousands of priests.

Archbishop Peter Chung Soon-taick of Seoul revealed in an interview that the Asian country is facing a major challenge in relation to the dwindling number of young people in 2022. According to official statistics, the nation has the lowest birth rate in the world, with only 0.8 children per couple. Because of this, the number of young people in churches has also decreased.

So WYD "could become an excellent opportunity to bring young people together around a project that makes them protagonists. It would start a process and, once it is completed, it would be good to share with everyone what we have experienced. It would be a missionary opportunity to share the values of the Gospel in our society," he concluded.

Even so, the number of Catholics in South Korea has increased by 50 per cent in the last twenty years. In that time, the percentage of Catholics in the country has gone from 8.3 per cent to 11.1 per cent, reaching more than 6 million Catholics. A fact to be noted is the peculiarity of the beginning of the Catholic faith: its establishment and dissemination were developed in Korea on the initiative of the people, simple people, and not by priests or missionaries. The scholars, coming into contact with religious books from the West, understooad and accepted Catholicism as a religion, not as a study or literature, realising that the sacraments could only be administered by priests. Thus, the Catholic community began to cross the borders with China to bring priests to Korea, even at the risk of death.

May World Youth Day in Korea be an event of grace and hope for young people in Asia and around the world.

Before announcing the location of the next WYD, Francis also invited young people from all over the world to participate in the Jubilee of Youth, which will take place in Rome in 2025: **"I count on your presence in 2025 to celebrate together the Jubilee of Young people".**
